Practices vary depending on the students involved. Algebra II team meets every Tuesday at 7 a.m. Freshmen/Sophomore team meets during homeroom. Practices usually start in November and now that the team is going to state, they will continue practicing until the state competition in May. Most practices are about 45 minutes long to an hour. Incidentally, the answer to the question in the headline is k=10, w=3.

Several students also won prizes including Molly Rush who competed in the mad-minute competition and won a laptop computer.

Gates said the competition was its sixth year and this marks the fifth year, PCS has competed.

According to Gates, the team has been practicing for the competition since February.

Bracelet making is an assembly line process at the Ebbing home in Pittsfield.

Layken, 6 and Lexi 9, string the beads, color coded to represent the various types of cancer, and their mother Ashley attaches the clasp and puts them in a clear plastic bag with the color code in it.

"We make bracelets almost every night," Ashley Ebbing said. "We go camping on the weekends and take our stuff with us and do it around the campfire."

Ebbings says she buys her supplies from a vendor who will donate 15 percent of her total purchase to the American Cancer Society.

"And we donate a portion of our profits to the local American Cancer Society, too," Ebbing said. "Bracelets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for children."

The trio will make special orders also.

"We had a request for all pink

ones, to represent breast cancer," Ebbing said. "We will do those, but they have to be ordered in advance. Also large orders. I had one customer who wanted almost 15 of them. We didn't have that many on hand at that time."

Ebbing was chairman of the local Relay for Life for two years but her project is not connected with the event.

"It's just something we do," she said. "We're not on a team or anything."

Lexi Ebbing said making the bracelets is fun.

"I like to do the bracelets," she said.

Laykin says she enjoys the creative side of the bracelets.

"I like to decorate things," she said.
