Salaries set for Scott County officials

The county commissioners at their meeting Monday afternoon set the salaries of elected Scott County officials who are up for election in November.

The officials up for election are Scott County clerk, the county Commissioners and the Scott County Circuit Clerk.

The salary of the county clerk and circuit clerk for the fiscal year of 12/1/12- 11/30/13 is \$39,293 and for the next fiscal year it will go to \$40,472. The next two years will

see a 2 percent increase each year.

For county commissioners, the current salary per year is \$13,030 and will remain the same for the following fiscal year. The yearly amount will go to \$13,291 for the fiscal year of 12/1/14-11/30/15 and to \$13,557 for the year of 12/1/15-11/30/16. The following two fiscal years will see 2% increases each year.

Craig Lashmett and Bob Schafer voted Yes on the resolution and Dave Killebrew voted No.

A resolution was approved that re-appoints Max Edlen of Bluffs to a five-year term on the Mid-America

Intermodal Port Authority District.

Right-of-way request and culvert replacement near Hoots Rd. bridge is scheduled for this month, according to County Engineer Matt Coultas.

Repair of Wilson Lane is to be performed this summer. Road Districts No. 4 and No. 7 are considering similar repair process for Reid Rd., Vortman Lane and Lee Rd.

Pavement durapatching continues along county highways.

Dyer talked about the baseball team, the season highlights, improvements that have been made and gave a list of future improvements planned for the program. He has been in the district for six years.

Highlights included defeating 1A state champ Carrollton; losing twice to Routt; and not-

ing that post season play starts May 14.

Improvements made include holding a bowling fundraiser, which made \$3,700 with the money being used to buy new uniforms. Others included painting the dugouts black and grey; building a bullpen mound and rebuilding the mound on the field and building up the batter's box.

Future improvements listed included: Continue to build a winning attitude that would be a winning program comparable to Routt and Carrollton. Dyer said that a goal would be to build the program through the junior high

level and "get some kids playing baseball over the summer to help improve their knowledge and skill of the game."

(Continued from A1) alleges that Sturgeon, between the dates of Feb. 12, 2009 and Oct. 19, 2011, "exerted unauthorized control over property of Alsey-Glasgow Water Commission, a unit of local government, that being currency having a total value in excess of \$10,000, by causing debit card transactions and checks to various vendors and payroll checks to himself in excess of the pay he

was entitled to receive to be issued totaling \$10,533.51, without the authority or consent of the Alsey-Glasgow Water Commission, intending to deprive Alsey-Glasgow Water Commission permanently of the use of the property, contrary to the form of the statute in such case made and provided."

The official misconduct charge alleges that as an employee of the Alsey-Glasgow Water Commission,

Sturgeon used funds belonging to the commission for personal purchases. Hill could not elaborate on the specific manner in which the funds were used.

The charges replace the charges previously filed. Sturgeon was arrested by Illinois State Police Feb. 3 on a warrant for theft over \$500.

The unlawful possession of a firearm with a revoked FOID card allegation is in reference to Sturgeon

having a Rossi 357 Magnum revolver in his possession Feb. 3 at a time when his FOID card was revoked by the ISP.

Sturgeon pleaded guilty Oct. 4, 2010 in the Scott County Courthouse to two misdemeanor counts of unlawful receipt of compensation by a water commissioner. In exchange for his guilty plea, Sturgeon paid \$750 plus court costs on each charge.
