

Video gaming, zoning issues discussed at July 3 village committee meetings

At the July 3 committee meetings, Village of Chatham trustees, local residents and business owners again debated the proposed video gaming ordinance that was voted on by the village board at its regular meeting July 10 (see front page story).

In 2009, the State of Illinois passed the Video Gaming Act, making video poker machines legal at bars and restaurants that serve alcohol, fraternal and veterans organizations, and truck stops.

The State controls all of the machines and will receive 30 percent of the profits, and participating municipalities would receive five percent of the State's take of the machines in their respective towns.

The Illinois Gaming Board is now moving closer to finally approving licenses, and municipalities all over the state are considering whether to approve gambling in their towns. Some local ones already have, including Riverton and Pawnee.

Each establishment can have a maximum of five machines, and there are 11 places in Chatham currently that could house the gambling machines, if they so choose.

The board has now discussed the issue at two different committee meetings, and the issue is expected to come for a vote July 10. There was about 25 minutes of civilized discussion on the issue at the July 3 meeting. Final language for the proposed ordinance is still to be worked out, with the possibility of a \$25 fee per machine being included. Also, trustees will work on establishing a specific fund or earmark for funds raised from the machines if the ordinance passes.

"What you'll be getting are casinos in Chatham," stated Anita Bedell, Executive Director of the Illinois Church Action on Alcohol and Addiction Problems. "Women become very addicted to these machines. It's a choice to begin with, but once they become addicted, the choice is gone. I want to urge you to keep the ban on gambling in Chatham."

Cindy Candiote explained that Illinois is going to be much more strict about licensing and the machines than other states.

"In Illinois, everybody is licensed, including the operators and machines," she stated. "The machines can only go in marked off locations, and they must be monitored. No one under 21 can get near these machines. You can only bet five cents or \$2 dollars at a time, and the most you can win at one time is \$500."

"If all the towns around us pass this, and we don't, we may lose that business," said Kevin Daugherty, co-owner of The Creek. "That's what we don't want to happen."

"We respect both sides of the argument," added Mike Monseur, owner of Godfathers Pizza. "When we started here 10 years ago, we made a commitment to the community. We want to have a fair chance of competing, and I feel like the business operators in this town are responsible."

Trustees also weighed in on the issue, including Chuck Herr. "I am against it," he stated. "I do not feel in any way that gambling improves the quality of life in the community. Why is it that we'll sell our souls to get a buck? It adds an element that we are not looking for in our community."

"Like I said two weeks ago, where's it going to stop?" added Matthew Mau. "When will the

government stop telling us how to spend or not spend our money? Springfield is going to pass this - why give that business to them? Keep it here. Look at the entire picture. We need to do it."

"I understand both sides of the argument," stated Ken Boyle. "I'd like to see some language added that earmarks certain programs for this type of revenue to benefit. I agree that we should move it for a vote next week."

"I don't like to see the business community in Chatham at a disadvantage," added Dan Holden. "A lot of this has been going on for years behind the scenes. I want to make sure our businesses are on equal footing, but I'm very leery to support additional liquor licenses where the business model is solely focused on gambling."

"It's not our position to regulate choice," stated Tom Kavanagh. "This isn't going to add any different behaviors than are already there. It's been happening under the table already, and this will be controlled and regulated."

"This is a very difficult issue for me," said Joe Schateman. "I have to talk to legislators about this for my job, and I know this bill like the back of my hand. I have so many mixed feelings on this issue. The question I have to raise is, if we allow these machines in Chatham, how much will that increase addiction?"

In other news from the July 3 committee meetings:

Deputy Police Chief Vernon Folt told trustees about an intergovernmental agreement being worked out with the City of Springfield. At issue is a portion of Gordon Drive, between the Willows and Woodland Trail, that is under Springfield Police jurisdiction, due to land the City of Springfield owns on the east side of Gordon in that area.

Folt explained that Chatham officers are able to write traffic tickets in that area, since it is a

village road, but in cases of accidents the Springfield PD has jurisdiction and it could take a long time for an officer to respond.

With the mutual aid agreement being proposed, both departments will be able to cooperate with each other, and Chatham officers will be able to respond to incidents as needed.

The Zoning Board of Appeals recently voted 4-0 to deny a request from Joe Rath for a zoning change at the front of his property, located on Wesley Chapel Road, just north of the Lick Road intersection. Rath came to the committee meetings to talk to trustees, explaining that he is requesting a move from P-1 to R-1 zoning for a three-fourths of an acre portion of the property. Rath plans to build a home for his son and his family.

At the zoning hearing, there were several objections heard from residents along the road. But in discussing the matter at the committee meetings, trustees and village officials may have learned of zoning violations concerning other property owners in the area. Residents in the area are not within village limits, but they are included in pre-annexation agreements.

"I'm trying to do this the right way," Rath explained. "There are a lot of residential homes in the area."

The consensus among the trustees was to allow the zoning change. A super-majority will be needed to overturn the Zoning Board's recommendation, village officials said.

The South Sangamon Water Plant is producing close to two million gallons of water a day during this hot and dry stretch. There is still some minor tweaking being done to the water, and punch list items remain to be finished. There is plenty of water and there are not threats of any type of conservation measures being needed at this time, according to Planning and Engineering

Coordinator Mike Williamsen.

Work on the first phase of the Plummer Boulevard Bike Trail extension project is expected to begin in late July and could finish by the end of the year, Williamsen said. There has been no movement on the status of the grant begin sought for Phase 2, he added.

The Illinois Commerce Commission has requested a meeting with village officials to discuss the possibility of moving the Spruce Street railroad crossing further to the south, to Goldenrod. This would require acquisition of property and other issues. More information will be available after that meeting.

The first round of interviews

have been completed for the Code Enforcement Officer position, and the position is expected to be filled sometime in August.

The final plat of Breckenridge Manor, Plat 5, involves five lots that front Gordon Drive. There was discussion about access points, turnarounds and driveway configuration. Talks will continue at the committee level.

Griffin gets ace



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
