



HISTORIC FARM DAYS

New facility to host event's featured equipment

Penfield fest runs through Sunday

PENFIELD — Minneapolis-Moline and BF Avery farm equipment will reign at this year's Historic Farm Days, which runs through this weekend in Penfield. And don't be surprised to see a Doodlebug or two.

The annual Historic Farm Days will be held Thursday through Sunday on the grounds of the I & I Antique Tractor and Gas Engine Club. While there will be a few events Thursday, the show gets rolling Friday.

Showgoers will notice an addition to the show grounds — a new structure on the north end of the property.

"We have a new building that has been erected that will host the feature brand equipment," I&I President John Fredrickson said.

A dedication ceremony for the new building is set for Saturday prior to the parade. The 60-by-96-foot building was paid for from donated funds and is equipped to be open on the sides during dry weather and can be closed in the event of rain. The building is located near the sawmill.

It will house this year's featured equipment line, Minneapolis-Moline.

olis-Moline. Each year, Historic Farm Days features a different line of equipment.

"Minneapolis-Moline was a major implement company at one time," Fredrickson said. "I believe they were bought by White Motor Co., and then White basically got in financial problems, and they became

part of the AGCO Group."

Historic Farm Days will host the national show of the BF Avery Collectors Association. Fredrickson said Avery made smaller tractors.

"They were in some of the ... smaller farms in the country back in the '40s," Fredrickson said. "They were smaller than

an International M."

Many were sold through Montgomery-Ward.

International Harvester and John Deere are the most popular farm implement lines in this part of the country and draw the largest crowds to Historic Farm Days.

"We still have decent atten-

dance for some of these smaller brands," Fredrickson said.

Also on display will be New Idea equipment. New Idea primarily manufactured corn pickers and manure spreaders.

A collection of Doodlebugs will be on display. The Doodlebug is the colloquial name for a homemade tractor in the United States during World War II when production tractors were in short supply. The Doodlebug of the 1940s was generally based on a 1920s or 1930s-era Ford automobile, which was modified either by the complete removal or alteration of some of the vehicle body.

"This is something that people with mechanical ability put together to make their own machine," Fredrickson said.

Event draws on past years for new attractions

FISHER — The Fisher Community Fair and Horse Show harks back to the past to add some new attractions to this year's fair, which runs this week.

In its 71st year, the fair uses a couple of features from years ago to help keep the annual event fresh.

One is a garden tractor pull. The way the weight is added

in the event is a blast from the past.

"It's not your typical tractor pull," said Jill Hardesty, fair board president. "It is with a step-on sled. It's a big sheet of metal. Every 25 feet, people step on this sled."

The more modern method of adding weight in a tractor pull is using a mechanical sled, but fair organizers got nostalgic for the garden tractor pull.

"A lot of small towns around

here have (garden tractor pulls). We thought we'd try it," Hardesty said.

"It's basically how tractor pulls used to be before the mechanical sleds. If you don't like a lot of smoke and a lot of noise, this is the tractor pull for you. It's just plain garden tractors. You can't soup them up."

The garden tractor pull will begin at 6:30 p.m. Thursday. The fair opens today and

runs through Saturday.

On Thursday night, those attending the fair are asked to bring canned food on Giveback Night to help replenish the Fisher Food Pantry.

There will be reduced prices for admission and rides on the Midway.

Danville teen drowned in pool, coroner confirms

DANVILLE — An autopsy Monday confirmed that Danville teenager found in an apartment complex pool early Sunday morning died from drowning, according to the Vermilion County coroner's office.

Jorge De La Hoya, 17, was pronounced dead at 3:03 a.m. Sunday at the emergency room at Provena United Samaritans Medical Center in Danville. Friends found Mr. De La Hoya unresponsive in the pool at the Sunset Cove Apartment Complex, 2200 N. Vermilion St., according to the coroner's office.

Doug Miller, deputy director of the Danville Police Department, said police responded to the call, but police are not investigating. He said there is no foul play or anything to investigate.

Miller would not disclose whether Mr. De La Hoya was a resident of the complex. He said others were at the pool at the time of the incident.

According to the Vermilion County coroner's new release, that office is continuing to investigate the circumstances surrounding Mr. De La Hoya's death, and toxicology results are pending.

Bicycling suspect faces charges in home burglary

URBANA — Police arrested an Urbana teen on Sunday in connection with an apartment burglary after they saw him pedaling away on a bicycle several blocks away from the incident.

Allen Beard Baines, 19, who listed an address in the 200 block of West Washington Street, Urbana, pleaded innocent on Monday to felony residential burglary.

According to an Urbana police report, a man living in the 600 block of South Broadway Avenue reported hearing a loud noise in his apartment at about 2:30 p.m. Sunday. The victim said some electronic equipment, including an iPod, were missing from the apartment, and he saw a man run out of the building and leave on a bicycle.

Urbana police saw a man matching the description given by the victim riding a bicycle at Vine Street and California Avenue and stopped him.

Baines admitted to police that he had just sold the iPod to another person, according to the report.

Baines was taken to the Champaign County Jail. His next court appearance was set for Aug. 2

In 1912, the Urbana school census had been completed, and it showed an Urbana population of 9,440, up from 8,707 a year earlier. Between the ages of 6 and 21, there were 1,234 males and 1,241 females, or a total of 129 more than the previous year.
In 1962, a tax levy of \$4.36 million was needed to operate the 1962-63 Champaign school district budget submitted to the school board. The tax rate would be \$2.61 per \$100 of assessed valuation, an increase from that year's \$2.43. The actual school district budget was

\$7.18 million, but with state aid and other outside revenue, the cost to Champaign taxpayers would be \$4.36 million.
