





Shelbyville coach Stan Wienke bit the hand that once fed him Friday night, as his Rams beat the visiting Tuscola Warriors 28-6 for their first win of the season. Ram senior quarterback Tucker Schwengel was the difference, as he rushed for 113 yards and threw for another 191 yards and a pair of scores to account for over 300 of Shelbyville's 348 total yards.

The Warriors dropped to 1-2 on the season and under .500 for the first time in recent memory. Tuscola's long streak of playoff appearances may be in jeopardy.

The game was delayed for almost two hours because of severe thunderstorms and Shelbyville's gridiron became a quagmire by kickoff, at about 9 p.m. After trading punts, Shelbyville drew first blood when Schwengel hit Luke Hatfield with a 17-yard touchdown pass down the left sideline with 5:39 left in the first quarter. The extra-point kick gave the Rams a 7-0 lead.

The field conditions were wreaking havoc on both teams' offenses the next few series, with slipping and sliding all around. After trading punts, the Rams came up with a big special teams play with a minute left in the first quarter when Hatfield returned an Austin Martin punt 74 yards

for a touchdown and a 14-0 lead after the extra-point kick.

The Warriors played pretty solid defense in the second quarter, with good pressure on Schwengel by the front three especially. Sam Dailey, Dustin Haake and Dustin Clough each tracked down Schwengel for QB sacks in the second quarter. But Tuscola quarterback Eli Kauffman and the Warrior offense could not get untracked—Kauffman was sacked twice in the period—and the Rams took the 14-0 lead into intermission.

The Warrior offense looked crisp on its opening drive of the second half. Kauffman fed running backs Austin Sexson and Cole Evans into Ram territory and Kauffman had an eight-yard run before the drive stalled on the Ram 26. Warrior head man Rick Reinhart went for it on fourth-and-seven and senior receiver Nolan Walsh went up and over a defender to snag a Kauffman pass for the touchdown and the Warriors were back in it.

After a miscue on the snap and placement of the extra-point kick, Walsh made a heady play by passing to Sexson, but he was stopped just short of the goal and the Rams held a 14-6 lead with 7:40 left in the third quarter.

The Warriors then had a chance on Shelbyville's next drive when Sexson poked the ball loose from Schwengel and it was recovered by senior Eric Crist. Tuscola look over at midfield but just could not sustain any offense. The Rams took over on downs on their own 45-yard line and mounted the scoring drive that would put the game out of reach. The Rams and Schwengel converted three huge third downs on the drive, the killer being a 30-yard pass to Hatfield down to the Warrior 10-yard line on third down and 11 to go.

It was academic from there and Hatfield ran over two Tuscola tacklers for the four-yard TD run with 1:31 left in the third quarter. The conversion run failed, but Shelbyville's 20-6 lead heading into the fourth quarter looked much bigger, considering the field conditions and the Warriors offensive struggles.

The Warriors threatened once more when Kauffman found safety valve Dan Yoakum for 26 yards down to the Ram 33-yard line, but the drive fizzled on downs. Shelbyville then took over and finished off the Warriors with a four-minute drive culminated by Schwengel's 26-yard pass to a wide-open Wyatt Fox over the middle for the touchdown. Schwengel drove in for the conversion run and the Rams had their 26-6 victory ensured with 4:04 left in the game.

It was a shocking defeat for the Warriors, the coaches and the fans, as many had counted this game as a win when looking at the schedule

before the season. After last week's loss to Monticello, many had counted Shelbyville as a "must win" type of game in looking at the remaining schedule and quality of those opponents. Five wins is the bare minimum for postseason qualification. After the game, Reinhart was visibly upset as he figured his team would bounce back from last week's home loss to Monticello in a must-win situation on the road. He didn't mince words. "Our poor tackling and lack of communication killed us," Reinhart said. "As far as the communication goes I guess that part is on me; the bottom line always rests with the head coach on that stuff. But the poor tackling...we need guys to step up and tackle."

"Offensively we had a real nice drive to start the second half and I thought maybe we were in business, but after that it was more bad execution and miscommunication. We've got an awful lot of work to do. This is a game we needed to win."

Kauffman hit six of 17 pass attempts for 92 yards on the night, with one TD and one interception after the ball slipped out of his hand. Sexson led Tuscola rushers with 30 yards on 11 attempts, while Evans had 27 yards on 10 rushes. Kauffman and Yoakum each had 17 yards.

Yoakum had 43 yards receiving on three catches while Walsh had 39 on two, plus a TD catch. Tuscola had 202 total yards of offense compared to Shelbyville's 348.

On defense, Dustin Haake led the way with nine total tackles. Christian Wood and Austin Sexson each had eight stops, while Austin Beniach was next with seven. Walsh, Zach Bates and Tristan Williams each had four tackles.

The Warrior host Decatur St. Teresa Sept. 14 in a battle of struggling 1-2 teams looking desperately for a win. Radio station 95.3/93.5 Connect FM will be doing a tape-delayed broadcast of the game on Saturday morning at 9 a.m.

Westjohn and the boys stay on course with golf win streak intact

Cameron Westjohn and the Warriors boys' golf team continued their winning ways this past week, opening with wins over Decatur St. Teresa, Shiloh, and Shelbyville on Monday, Sept. 10; and Charleston and Villa Grove on Tuesday, Sept. 11. They ended it with a win over Chrisman on Thursday, Sept. 13 to remain unbeaten on the year.

Westjohn leads the way on the squad with a 37-stroke average for the year. The senior was on his game again, firing a two-over-par 38 on a very tough Eagle Creek course to capture medalist honors last Monday. It was a warm-up for one of the area's best and his team, on a course that will play host to the Okaw Valley Tournament next week.

Luke Heinz was next up with a solid 43 to take fourth overall in the 25-golfer event. Gunnar Campbell and Eddie Durham occupied the three and four spots for Coach Matt Franks, both carding a 45. Austin Cochenour rounded out the team scoring with a 49. Dylan Taylor and Jackson McCory also took a trip around the course, turning in a 51 and 52 respectively. Tuscola edged Shelbyville on its home course by a mere three strokes, winning 171-174.

It was Westjohn again

out front one night later, only this time he was two strokes lower. He fired his best round

of the year, posting a one-under-par 35 in a home meet at Ironhorse. The sub-par

effort helped the Warriors to a 28-stroke victory over a good Charleston team.

Cochennour shone as well in front of the home crowd, carding a two-over 38. Heinz was next up in the scoring column with a 42, followed by Durham, who shot a 44. Not only were Tuscola's top four top dogs, but Campbell—the coach's alternate—held down the fifth spot overall, tallying a 45.

A few nights later, on Thursday at home against

Chrisman, Coach Franks chose to rest his three top golfers. Gunnar Campbell stepped up to the plate, shooting a season-best 41 to capture the medalist spot. He wasn't the only one to make sure the Warriors' unblemished mark would stay intact. McCory also fired his low round of the year, carding a 42 as the Warriors improved to 12-0 on the year by dumping the Cardinals 176-206.

Also scoring for the Warriors were Dylan Taylor (44),

and Durham (49). Jarrett Wallace and Jacob Stuart teed off as well for Franks' squad.

Annie Heinz was the front runner for the girls in a loss to St. Teresa the same night. Heinz fired a 54 to lead the Warriors. Sophomore Taylor Riefsteck was next up for Tuscola, shooting a 58, and following was Emma Sementi in the three-spot for Coach Franks with a 59. Tiffany Davis rounded out the scoring, posting a 61.

Race day registration and check-in will be from 6:30 to 7:30 a.m. at Ervin Park's north pavilion. This is the same spot from which the 8 a.m. race will start and end. Please note the kids 1K fun run will begin 10 minutes after the last 5K competitor finishes. An awards ceremony will follow completion of both races. Medals will be given to the top three finishers in each group, and to the top three walkers. All kids will receive a participation ribbon.

Age categories in which adult participants will be grouped are as follows. For men and for women it is 0-14, 15-19, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59, and 60-plus.

During the morning, there will be inflatables in the park for kids to enjoy at no cost, from 8 to 10:30 a.m.

Don't want to run or walk in the race? How about volunteering the day of the

event, as there will be plenty of opportunity to lend a helping hand to make sure all goes smoothly. You can always come and cheer on the runners and walkers, who would undoubtedly appreciate the encouragement.

Proceeds from the event will be used to supplement classroom education efforts.




