20 FIRST AMENDED AFFIDAVIT OF LARRY DURBIN

22 (Submitted on Behalf of the Shelby County Landowners' Group)

24 Now comes LARRY DURBIN, and after first being duly sworn upon his oath deposes

25 and says:

26 **Q.** Please state your name and address and occupation for the Record.

27 **A.** My name is Larry Durbin. I reside at R.R. 1 Box 172A, Shelbyville, Shelby County,
28 Illinois. I am a self-employed farmer, and I also own and operate a cattle raising operation in
29 Shelby County.

30 **Q.** What interest do you have in the pending litigation, I.C.C. docket number 12-0598?

31 **A.** I, along with my wife, own 350 acres of valuable farmland in Shelby County, which will
32 be affected if the alternate route proposed by the Moultrie County Property Owners is chosen.
33 Additionally, we are tenant farmers on another 800 acres of farmland which is part of the
34 alternate route of the Moultrie County Property Owners. We raise grain crops on this ground,
35 including corn, soybeans, and wheat; and, further, we have obtained the necessary governmental

36 and EPA permits to construct a new cattle facility upon our farmland, the construction of which
37 has already begun. After the Moultrie County Property Owners proposed their “alternate route,”
38 which passes through Shelby County, and my land, I realized that my ground would be
39 substantially affected.

40 **Q.** What potential impacts do you foresee on your cattle operation?

41 **A.** First and foremost, according to the maps filed by Moultrie County Property Owners, that
42 their alternate route will be in close proximity to (if not on top of) my new, state of the art feedlot
43 for cattle, which when complete, will house 600 head of cattle. Construction has begun on this
44 facility and I have invested thousands of dollars obtaining the necessary permits to construct the
45 facility, which could all be for naught if the Moultrie County Property Owners’ “alternate route”
46 is selected. According to these permits, I am required to place the facility on a specific location
47 and the potential transmission lines will have an adverse impact upon my ground, feedlot, and
48 cattle herd.

49 After a lifetime in the agricultural field, and the cattle business in particular, I am familiar
50 with the best practices for raising cattle. The noise or “hum” of the transmission lines will
51 create undue stress on my cattle, thereby potentially leading to a decrease in their daily weight
52 gain, which will lead to lower profits and potential losses, considering the high costs of feed
53 inputs.

54 Additionally, I have become aware of a condition associated with transmission lines
55 known as “Stray Voltage” which causes a low level electrical shock to animals in confined areas.
56 My research on the subject has revealed that “stray voltage” from the transmission lines may
57 reduce water and feed intake of the cattle, thereby reducing herd health, reducing daily weight
58 gain, and thereafter negatively affecting my operation’s bottom line. Upon information and

59 belief, the Moultrie County Property Owners have not addressed any of these issues in the
60 selection of their route through Shelby County

61 As part of the long term plans for my cattle operations, we will expand the facility in the
62 future. The Moultrie County Property Owner's alternate route for the transmission lines will be
63 directly above the location which is currently planned for expansion. If the lines are placed
64 through Shelby County, it will be extremely difficult, and likely impossible, for me and my wife
65 to expand our cattle operation. This is a hardship myself, my wife, and my family, cannot
66 withstand.

67 Q. What impact will the transmission lines have on your grain farming operation?

68 A. Obviously, the most notable affect will be on my ability to plant, till, and harvest the
69 crops, depending on the placement of the poles. I understand every farmer, no matter where the
70 line is located, will have the same impacts upon their grain farming operations. There is,
71 however, a major difference here in Shelby County, and my land in particular, in that the tracts
72 of farmland here are generally smaller than those in areas to the North. With smaller tracts of
73 farmland, it becomes more difficult to maneuver machinery around obstructions. This is the case
74 with my land and the land of most, if not all, of my neighbors potentially affected by the
75 alternate route of the Moultrie County Property Owners.

76 The potential alternate route will also affect my ability to aeriually apply fertilizer,
77 fungicide, and other chemicals to my crops, as I have always done in the past. Many of the tracts
78 of property in Shelby County are bordered by trees, and, as I previously stated, most of the tracts
79 of land are relatively small compared to tracts of farmland to the North. Aerial applicators are, at
80 this time, used to apply the necessary chemicals to my fields. However, if a transmission line is
81 placed on my tracts of farmland, the use of aerial applicators will become extremely difficult and

82 likely impossible, due to the additional obstruction created by the transmission lines, in
83 conjunction with the current obstructions created by woodlands.

84 **Q.** Will the loss of aerial application negatively affect your grain farming operations?

85 **A.** Yes, it will. I use aerial application to apply certain chemicals, fungicides in particular,
86 to increase my crop yield. These chemicals must be applied at certain times during the growing
87 cycle when traditional, ground application is impossible or will cause more damage than the
88 gained benefit of aerial application of the chemicals. The inability to use aerial application will
89 reduce my yield and, in turn, my profits.

90 **Q.** Will other landowners in the area in which you reside and farm be similarly affected?

91 **A.** Yes, they will. My neighbors and friends will be affected in much the same way as I am.
92

93 **Q.** Do you own any woodlands?

94 **A.** Yes. My wife and I own tracts of timber which consist predominately of oak and hickory
95 trees. We also have stands of walnut trees which are being cultivated for timber production.

96 **Q.** Are your walnut trees mature and ready for harvest?

97 **A.** No they are not. It will take 20 or more years for the trees to reach maturity. My
98 woodlands will be affected by the proposed alternate route of the Moultrie County Property
99 Owners, and if the lines are constructed, many acres of my woodlands will be destroyed, thereby
100 negating the investments I have made in the production of harvestable walnut timber.

101 **Q.** Are there any other impacts on lands which concern you if the transmission lines are
102 constructed as proposed by the Moultrie County Property Owners?

103 **A.** Yes. My wife and I have drain tiles installed on tracts of land which are potentially
104 affected. The construction of the power lines will include the use of heavy machinery, concrete

105 trucks, and heavy materials being upon the land, all of which have the ability to collapse tile
106 upon my property. When the drain tiles are collapsed, they will not adequately drain my fields
107 and will thereafter flood out my crops. I depend on these crops to feed my cattle and to provide
108 for my family.

109 **Q.** Are you familiar with the lands which are potentially affected by the alternate route
110 proposed by the Moultrie County Property Owners'?

111 **A.** Yes, I am. I have lived in Shelby County my entire life. Further, my land is located in
112 Shelbyville Township and I regularly travel the roads and area which encompasses the
113 potentially affected land. Further, I am familiar with the topographic layout of the area in Shelby
114 County which is affected by the "alternate route" of the Moultrie County Property Owners.

115 **Q.** Could you please describe the terrain and/or topographic conditions of the area within the
116 affected lands of Shelby County?

117 **A.** Beginning in the Tower Hill, Illinois area, the land is gently rolling with areas of flat,
118 productive, agricultural farmland. Thereafter, the line will begin to pass through many acres of
119 hilly, wooded acreage. This hilly wooded acreage is comprise of oak/hickory woodlands; and,
120 further, supports numerous species of wildlife, including, but not limited to white-tailed deer and
121 wild turkeys, all of which provide for valuable hunting opportunities for the county residents
122 including my family and, others alike.

123 Once the proposed route nears Shelbyville, Illinois, the line will pass through the
124 Kaskaskia River bottoms and across the River, a major tourist spot in Central Illinois. Many
125 individuals own river front property wherein they maintain cabins. Also, any visitors, and
126 residents alike, travel the river to fish, hunt, and boat on the river.

127 Once the proposed route clears the Kaskaskia River bottoms, it appears to run through
128 gently rolling hills, until finally reaching prime, agricultural farmland. Along the route, the line
129 appears to affect numerous homes and farms, however, I am unable to discern the exact number
130 without the Moultrie County Property Owners' submitting the exact location of their proposed
131 route for the line.

132 **Q.** What affect will the proposed route(s) of Ameren Transmission Company of Illinois have
133 upon your interests and other interests of those in the Shelby County Landowner's Group?

134 **A.** There will be no direct impact upon my land or the land of anyone else in the Shelby
135 County Landowner's Group. The route(s) chosen by Ameren, for the Pana to Mt. Zion and Mt.
136 Zion to Kansas routes, avoid the recreational areas, woodlands, and agricultural farmland, while
137 the "alternate route" advanced by the Moultrie County Property Owners' does not.

138 **Q.** Are you aware of any public bodies in Shelby County which have adopted a position in
139 this matter?

140 **A.** Yes. I am personally aware that Rose, Shelbyville, and Ash Grove Townships have
141 passed Resolutions in support of Ameren and in opposition to the alternate route proposed by the
142 Moultrie County Property Owners. In fact, I have obtained copies of the resolutions from Rose,
143 Shelbyville, and Ash Grove Townships, and I attach copies of the same hereto as Exhibits A, B,
144 and C, respectively.

145 **Q.** Have you seen the originals of these documents and are the copies exactly the same as the
146 originals?

147 **A.** Yes, I have seen the originals and the copies are true and accurate copies of the originals.

148 **Q.** Are you aware of any other governmental entities which are considering adopting a
149 position in this matter?


150 A. The Shelby County Board has on its April Board Meeting, public agenda, their

155 A. It does.


