Hardest pag pets is sayii

LOS ANGELES - You nurse and nurture, live with and love an animal in your home. After a few weeks or months, you turn it over to someone or return it to a shelter. Watching a foster pet leave the nest can be rewarding, but you are probably still going to cry your eyes out.

A foster home is a place where pets get a chance to heal or come of age or learn how to be social. It leaves room at the shelter for another dog or cat. Fostering is hard work and takes time, patience and dedication, but knowing you are raising and training a pet someone else can be equal parts gratification and heartbreak.

Beth Stern, spokeswoman for the North Shore Animal League America, has fostered several litters of cats. She says she can tell you what each one likes to eat, where they like to be rubbed and their favorite toys. She houses them and keeps meticulous records for adoption.

She and husband, talk show host and "America's Got Talent" judge Howard Stern, had planned to take just one litter.

"My husband and I had a ball. He named every one of them, photographed them and started talking about them on his radio show," Stern said. She shared photos and stories about them on Facebook and Twitter and on North Shore's website. Adoption applications started arriving at North Shore in bunches.

When the day came for the new owners to be notified, and the kittens returned to the shelter to be spayed and neutered, Stern said it "was one of the hardest days of my life."

"I was crying like a baby," she said.

While she said goodbye to six kittens, she ultimately said hello to 10 new ones. The adoptions keep on coming so Stern said she plans to keep on fostering. And while she and her husband already have four adult cats, she says they'll probably adopt another one - a blind cat at the shelter who will likely be hard to place.

And on Super Bowl Sunday, Stern will promote more cat adoptions on Hallmark Channel's "Kitten Bowl."

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals makes more than 1,000 foster placements a year, said Gail Buchwald, ASPCA's senior vice president of adoption.

Fosters are an indispensable component of shelters, but there's a lot of turnover - people who fall in love with their foster pets and adopt them.

When a foster becomes an adopter, no one's minds, Buchwald said, but it does leave shelter lives."

Kirkland woman killed in crash

KIRKLAND - An 80-year-old Kirkland woman was killed when her Chevrolet Tahoe collided with a 15-foot-wide agricultural planter Friday north of Kirkland.

Joyce C. Villers, of the 6600 block of Cherry Valley Road, was driving north on Pearl Street north of Wolf Road about 11:40 a.m., according to a news release from the DeKalb County Sheriff's Office. She crested a hill and came upon a southbound John Deere tractor pulling a farming implement.

"Neither one of them saw each other until they were reasonably close," Chief Deputy Gary Dumdie said.

The implement likely was partially in Villers' lane, as it was 15 feet wide and the lane is 11 feet wide, Dumdie said. Villers was pronounced dead at the scene, and the 17-year-old Genoa boy driving the tractor was taken to Kishwaukee Hospital with no visible injuries, Dumdie said.

The crash remains under investigation.

Motorcycle ride kicks off 2013 Toys for Tots program

Fall may have just arrived, but it's not too soon to think about the season of giving.

The 2013 Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots program in DeKalb County will kick off its annual drive for Christmas gifts for children in need with a motorcycle ride Saturday. It will start at 4 p.m. at DeKalb Harley-Davidson and end at the Genoa Veterans Home.

"This is our second attempt at it," Mike Fogelsanger, coordinator of the bike ride, said. "Last year, we did it in October and it was too cold, so we moved it up a month."

Despite 50-degree temperatures last year, more than 100 motorcyclists participated. So far this year, Fogelsanger

has been contacted by groups from Rockford, Chicago and Iowa.

"We may have 300 depending on the weather," he said.

Riders will pay \$10 plus a new, unwrapped toy to participate in the ride, and passengers will pay \$5. Proceeds support the local Toys for Tots. Fogelsanger said there is no set fundraising goal. The purpose of the ride is to make people aware that the season is coming and to think of those in need.

"It's tough times all around," he said.

Registration at DeKalb Harley-Davidson, 969 N. Peace Road, is from 3 to 4 p.m. The route travels through DeKalb and Sycamore before ending at the Genoa Veterans Home, 311 S. Washington St., which will host an after party from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. Fogelsanger said riders will be escorted by local police and fire departments.

Jake Zimmerman, marketing manager for DeKalb Harley-Davidson, said the kickoff ride coincides with the store's Octoberfest, which runs from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., featuring German food and beer and a performance by a local band from noon to 4 p.m. Shooter also will perform at the after party.

"This is for a good cause," Zimmerman said. "We're

happy to be part of it."

Kathi Hogshead Davis, DeKalb County ride coordinator, said Toys for Tots collection boxes will be located throughout DeKalb County from the first week of November through Dec. 14. Toys will be distributed by The Salvation Army in DeKalb just before Christmas.

Last year, Fogelsanger said more than 12,000 toys were donated in the county, including some last-minute gifts organizers purchased Christmas Eve.

"Nobody wants to tell any child they can't have a toy," he said.

Zimmerman said the Harley dealership also will partner with Opportunity House for a fundraiser in October. A chili cook-off is planned at the dealership Oct. 19.



Cadets clip Eagles

AURORA — Marmion wasn't going to fall twice.

After falling to defending state champion Montini last week, the Cadets had a shot at another champion Friday night in Aurora.

A stunned Aurora Christian crowd watched visiting Marmion crush the defending 3A state champion Eagles 35-14, firmly entrenching the Cadets in the Suburban Christian Conference Blue Division race. With perhaps the toughest part of their schedule behind them, Marmion is in the driver's seat for a high seed in the playoffs.

The difference for the Cadets (5-1, 3-1) was the health of junior running back Jordan Glasgow, who gashed the Aurora Christian (5-1, 3-1) defense for three first half scores — two rushing, one receiving — while gaining 123 yards on the night.

Glasgow had been nursing an ankle injury in the season's first couple of weeks but looked dynamic for much of the night. Glasgow, who received a cortisone shot several weeks ago, put the Cadets up 6-0 early in the first quarter with a 63-yard touchdown run, breaking a few tackles on his way to the end zone.

"I got a cortisone injection, which made it feel a lot better. It feels a lot better now, but the cortisone injection really helped a lot," Glasgow said. "It really made me ready to play almost right away. We played really well overall tonight."

Glasgow ran behind a shuffled offensive line that lost starting center Andy Matthews early on. The Cadets played on as Luke Juriga moved from

guard to center, and Jimmy Rogers slotted in at guard.

With the reworked offensive front, the Cadets ran roughshod over Aurora Christian, adding a second Glasgow score late in the first quarter. Facing a fourth-and-goal from the 2-yard line, Glasgow slipped through the left side of the line that gave Marmion a 14-0 lead.

Aurora Christian cut into the Marmion lead early in the second as Austin Bray hit Brandon Walgren on a 8-yard touchdown pass that made it 14-6. Marmion responded as Brock Krueger threw the first of two touchdown passes on the night, hooking up with Glasgow on a 7-yard strike that pushed the Marmion lead to 21-6.

A little over two minutes later, Krueger found Enzo Olabi on a 42-yard TD to push the lead to 28-6.

While everything seemed to go right for Marmion, it couldn't have gone worse for Aurora Christian. Already missing tight end Jackson Carpenter, the Eagles lost Bray, Walgren, Noah Roberts, Jon Czerwinski and Trevor Hills to injury.

Beebe said Bray is expected to miss the remainder of the regular season with a separated shoulder.

"Our problem right now is we don't have a quarterback" Beebe said. "Austin is going to be out for a while with a separated shoulder — AC joint."
