Hampshire to put gazebo at park along Route 72

HAMPSHIRE — The village board recently unanimously approved the purchase of a 14-foot gazebo from Leisure Woods Inc. in Genoa, for \$6,510 installed.

The gazebo will be erected on the 1.5-acre Memorial Park, at the southeast corner of Route 72 and Getzelman Road. The park currently has a bench and a flagpole that were installed by members of the Hampshire American Legion.

Board members said they expect the gazebo to be finished in November 2014.

According to Trustee Orris Ruth, the proposed gazebo will have a brown roof-

top, cedar sides and metal benches.

Trustee Mike Reid asked if there will be a light in the gazebo. Ruth said that no light is planned at this time but one could be added at a later date.

"The village was successful in obtaining grant funds using riverboat funding from Kane County," said Village Administrator Doug Maxeiner.

"The total grant amount is \$18,800, with \$4,000 of that total earmarked for a gazebo. While the recommendation from Trustee Orris Ruth (for the gazebo) exceeds the line item included in the grant budget, there is a contingency line item in the project budget that can accommo-

date the difference."

Maxeiner added that "there will be some concrete work required for the foundation and floor of the gazebo that will need to be funded as well. The non-grant funding will come from \$20,000 in park-impact fees that were included in the budget for the development of Memorial Park."

The budget for the park's development includes:

- \$14,800 for a bike path
- \$1,000 for a fixed grill
- \$2,400 for picnic tables
- \$10,000 for landscaping
- \$16,000 for a parking lot
- \$2,000 for signage.

The village committed \$43,000 for the project while not-for-profit donors have committed \$700. The total project budget is \$62,500.

Area cops take up '82 Tylenol slayings probe


CHICAGO — The unsolved investigation into the deaths of seven people who swallowed cyanide-laced Tylenol is returning to where it started more than 30 years ago, as a group of Illinois law enforcement agencies said Friday that the FBI will no longer lead the probe.

Police in Arlington Heights — where three of the victims died — announced in a news release that a task force made up of their department along with the Illinois State Police and police departments in Chicago, Elk Grove Village, Lombard, Schaumburg and Winfield will run the investigation.

The FBI will continue to “provide resources in areas of expertise as needed to support the investigation,” according to the release, adding that task force will also work with prosecutors’ offices in Cook County and DuPage County.

“The investigation is ongoing, and it continues to be active,” said Arlington Heights Police Commander Mike Hernandez. He said the logistics about what each agency will do still has to be worked out.

Friday’s announcement

comes two days shy of the 31st anniversary of the day people who’d taken Extra Strength Tylenol started to die of cyanide poisoning.

In a space of three days beginning Sept. 29, 1982, seven people who took cyanide-laced Tylenol in Chicago and four suburbs died. That triggered a national scare that prompted an untold number of people to throw medicine away and stores nationwide to pull Tylenol from their shelves.

In recent years, the case has taken a number of twists. In 2009, federal agents searched the Boston-area home of James W. Lewis, who once served 12 years in prison for sending an extortion note to Tylenol maker Johnson & Johnson demanding \$1 million to “stop the kill-

ing.” Lewis, who along with his wife gave DNA samples and fingerprints to investigators, denied any involvement in the poisonings. After the investigation that included a seizure of boxes, files and a computer from Lewis’ Cambridge, Mass., home he was never charged.

Then in 2011, the FBI took a DNA sample from the so-called Unabomber, Ted Kaczynski. Kaczynski, who grew up in the Chicago area and whose parents lived in the suburbs in 1982 when the Tylenol slayings occurred, denied in court papers that he ever “possessed any potassium cyanide” — the poison used — and he has not been charged. At the time, his lawyer suggested the FBI wanted Kaczynski’s DNA simply to rule him out as a suspect and not because agents believed he was involved.

As for the slayings themselves, the details of the deaths of the six adults and one 12-year-old girl have faded from memory. But much like the terrorist attacks of 9/11 resulted in new security measures in airports, the poisonings resulted in additional security measures taken in the packaging of food, drink and medicine to prevent tampering. Hear 'Freebird' Oct. 13 at Elgin's Festival Park

ELGIN — The third and final outdoor concert at Festival Park downtown takes place Sunday, Oct. 13, with Lynyrd Skynyrd and John Kay and Steppenwolf performing.

Things have gone well enough that plans are progressing to offer more shows in the city-owned park next summer.

"Onesti Entertainment is putting forth a plan to produce regular concerts and festivals in partnership with the Grand Victoria Casino and the city of Elgin. The plan is to include several multicultural, culinary and music-based events," Ron Onesti, CEO and president of Onesti Entertainment Corporation, stated in an email.

Onesti, whose business operates the Arcada Theatre in downtown St. Charles, has been working with Grand Victoria Casino for about two years beefing up its indoor entertainment.

"I continue to seek out a combination of unique and new acts combined with the best of the most popular entertainers," Onesti stated of the indoor offerings.

This summer, with Onesti producing, the casino decided to hold its "Rock and Roll Jackpot" outdoor concert series in Festival Park, which is adjacent to the Grand Victoria. The casino pays Elgin for use of the park, Onesti stated, and for any extra public safety workers they might put on duty at or near the park for the events.

An Aug. 24 concert featured '60s blues rockers Eric Burdon and the Animals and '80s new wave punk pop act Joan Jett and the Blackhearts. Another concert in the park

took place Sept. 21 with '70s rockers Grand Funk Railroad and '80s hair metal act Night Ranger.

According to Onesti, attendance at each show was more than 4,000 and, "all things considered, yes, they did (make money). .With the right formula and the right cooperation, excitement truly can be created."

Casino officials have said that after the Animals and Jett concert, 270 people signed up for Grand Victoria Club membership — four times the number they see on a typical Saturday night. "I have personally seen many people enter the casino after the show or before the shows," Onesti stated.

More than 3,000 tickets already have been sold to the Oct. 13 concert, which will be similar in format to the others, "but expanded to include a stage twice the size as what we've used in the past," Onesti stated.

Lynyrd Skynyrd, of course, is known for its southern fried rock, particularly "Freebird," one of the most popular power ballads of all time, which was first released in 1973. The pilot, copilot, road manager and three band members died in a plane crash in Mississippi in 1977 — singer Ronnie Van Zant, guitarist Steve Gaines and Gaines sister, Cassie, who sang backing vocals.

Kay and Steppenwolf are best known for "Born to Be Wild," the 1968 biker anthem used to great effect in 1969's "Easy Rider," the groovy road movie which featured Peter Fonda, Dennis Hopper and Jack Nicholson.

Tickets for the Oct. 13 Elgin show range from \$25 to \$99, with gates opening at 4 p.m. Steppenwolf is set to take the stage at 5:30 p.m., followed by Lynyrd Skynyrd at 7:30 p.m. For more information www.grandvictoriacasinoc.com/lynnyrdskynyrd.



man was convicted in the case.

"I recall going to the scene. I recall the prosecution was pretty straightforward. There was very solid evidence that put (Horton) at the scene committing the crime. The jury found him guilty, and the appellate court affirmed the verdict," said Loghi, who now leads the United Way of Rock River Valley.

"Without seeing the (Northwestern) materials, my recollection is that the case established guilt beyond reasonable doubt," including a confession from Horton.

But Tepfer said "all the facts weren't in front of the jury. The jury forewoman and a member of the jury said if they knew what was in this petition, it's pretty clear that Horton would have been found not guilty."

The forewoman was Janine Nunes, who later married Judge Gary Pumlilia, then a public defender who represented Horton. Nunes, then the editor of a weekly newspaper, wrote a column on April 5, 1995, expressing misgivings about voting to convict Horton. She wondered why "10 hours of interrogation (of Horton by police) had been reduced to a four-page confession statement and we were not allowed to see one word of it with our own eyes."

Nunes also wondered why Judge John W. Nielsen "ruled English would not be testifying. We weren't told why. The judge also ruled that testimony from witnesses about English admitting to the crime would

not be allowed. We were not allowed to see English or a photo of him to see if he matched the description of the killer provided by witnesses."

Nunes was more direct in Judy Emerson's column in the April 12, 1995, Register Star: "Knowing what I do now, I know I didn't make the right decision. I would do anything to straighten it out."

At the time, Mark Karner, the assistant state's attorney who prosecuted Horton, told Emerson he was "100 percent" certain Horton was guilty, the jury made the right decision and "this wasn't even a close case."

Karner, now with the U.S. attorney's office, said Friday that he wants to read the Northwestern filing before commenting further. Pumlilia said he would not comment because "there's now pending litigation," and his wife would have no comment, either.

The new evidence the Northwestern motion cites is a Feb. 13, 2013, notarized confession by English "in which he admits under oath that he alone committed the armed robbery and murder."

There's also a written, notarized statement English made to the Internal Affairs Division of Hill Correctional Center in 2008 "in which English correctly states that the victim was wearing a Hard Rock Cafe jacket. Both this statement and his 2013 confession are consistent in describing where the victim was shot (left side of face,) how much money was taken from the safe (\$500) and other facts."

The filing contains an affidavit from Dr. James

Tiller, English's psychiatrist at Hill Correctional, stating that English voluntarily confessed to the McDonald's murder to him in 2008. Finally, there's a 2006 letter from English to Loghi, saying English alone committed the murder.

Jennifer Aronoff, Imran Ahmad, Jonathon Jacobson and Molly Wyler are the Northwestern law students who worked on the new filing.

"I was one of the persons who went to interview Clifton English" in prison, Ahmad said. "He was glad we'd come. He'd wanted to talk about it for a long time. While he was describing how he committed the crime, on his own he drew a map of McDonald's, how and where everything happened."

It was plainly a legal error to exclude evidence of English's confession," Jacobson said.

"The case kept me up late at night. English is not trying to protect his cousin. English is projected to be discharged in 2019, when he'd be 60. If convicted of this murder he'd never get out," Wyler said.

"It was hard for me to understand how somebody would falsely confess to a crime. I've learned an enormous amount about confessions. Horton was a 17-year-old kid, put in a room for 10 hours by police. False confessions do happen," Jacobson said.

The students estimated that among the lawyers and students, more than 1,000 hours were spent preparing the court filing.

W.Va. pushes for natural gas trust fund

CHARLESTON, W.Va. — For decades, coal from West Virginia's vast deposits was mined, loaded on rail cars and hauled off without leaving behind a lasting trust fund financed by the state's best-known commodity. Big coal's days are waning, but now a new bonanza in the natural gas fields has state leaders working to ensure history doesn't repeat itself.

West Virginia's Senate president, Jeff Kessler, is pushing to create an oil and natural gas trust fund to support core government functions decades from now. His goal: a cushion of funds long

after the gas is depleted to buoy an Appalachian mountain state chronically vexed by poverty, high joblessness, and cycles of boom and bust.

The Democratic Senate leader said the previous generation missed out on creating a permanent fund based on coal severance tax revenues. Current residents, he said, should be prudent and set aside a part of the revenue from the extraction of natural gas to benefit future generations.

"Had we had the good sense to put a few cents aside of every ton of coal ... that has come out of our ground, we'd probably be the richest state in the Union instead of in many respects the

poorest," Kessler said.

Indeed, supporters say the future health and welfare of the state is, to some extent, at stake. West Virginia consistently has ranked among the states with the lowest life expectancy while grappling with problems of obesity, education and drug abuse.

"This is really about protecting the long-term fiscal health of the state," said Ted Boettner, executive director of the West Virginia Center on Budget and Policy.

succulents and more. There will also be sensory activities — smelling, tasting and touching plants — not only for the autistic children who often visit but all kids. And on pleasant days, the garden will be almost a magical spot for reading and story telling. There seems to be a light breeze through the garden all the time, said Wolf. The breeze is enough to cool visitors on humid days but not enough to chill them when the temperatures are lower.

No children have been in the garden yet but other creatures have explored it. A bunny, a squirrel and a large praying mantis have been spotted. Time-lapse photos of the plants as they grew this summer can be seen on Discovery Center's Facebook or YouTube pages.

Support for the garden came from a wide section of the community, including the Blazer Foundation, BMO Harris Bank, Rockford Pro Am, the Park District, and memorial funds in honor of Bobbie Gaines and Hunter Frankfort. Staff and volunteers at University Extension, Natural Land Institute, Klehm Arboretum, the Atwood Outdoor Education Center, Severson Dells, and the Nichols Conservatory and others also helped.

The garden has been in the planning and building stage for a year and Discovery Center is excited to open it soon. There will be no extra charge for visiting the garden.

"It's a garden. It will be changing all the time," she said. "By next spring, it will be fantastic."
